## Discussion Guide 20A Baptism and Confirmation (Questions 201, 204)

#### The Apostolate's Family Catechism™

Opening Prayer (5 min.)

Gospel Reading (see Liturgical Calendar box). Pause to reflect. When you are ready, end with an Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory Be. Announce the *Liturgical Season* and the *Significant Feast Days* for the week.

Recitation of Memory Verse (5 min.)

Ephesians 1:3-4 Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him.

## Discussion and Sharing on The Apostolate's Family Catechism (40 min.)

- Announce the topic and questions to be covered.
- Watch Commentaries with Cardinal Arinze video Q# 201 and 204 (4½ min.). Discuss.
- Read Q# 201 and 204 aloud and discuss the answers. Point out the illustrations and diagrams and allow family members to explain them. Read the captions on the illustrations. Read the Scripture quotes.
- Discuss the "Doctrine, Moral, Worship Exercises" at the end of Q# 201 and the "Thought Provokers" related to Q# 204 at the end of Chapter 59.

#### Closing Prayer (10 min.)

Invite everyone who wishes, to express their prayers of thanksgiving at this time.

End by praying the Chapter 59 Summary Prayer.

## **Family Activity**

#### Dying and Rising

In Baptism we die with Christ and rise with him. "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." John 12:24

Plant a seed in a pot (marigolds germinate in 2-4 days). Water and wait for it to sprout. When the sprout can be grasped with fingers, gently dig it up. What happened to the seed? Discuss how our sinful life (the seed) passed away in Baptism and our new life in Christ (the sprout) is growing.

Alternative: instead of growing from a seed, use cooking sprouts from the grocery.

## The Sacrament of Baptism - I

#### Q. 201. What is Baptism?

Baptism is the sacrament (1) of our rebirth as children of God, (2) of our unity with Jesus in His death and Resurrection, (3) of our being cleansed of Original Sin and personal sins, and (4) of our being welcomed into the community of the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ.

1. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth as children of God.

Baptism is directed toward our participation in the fullness of Christ's divine life. By this sacrament a man becomes truly incorporated into Christ and is reborn to a sharing in the divine life. Baptism is our new birth as children of God, a beginning of a new life in us, God's own life of grace brought to us by Jesus Christ. (cf. V.S., Section 118)

It is Christ Himself Who baptizes and makes us holy with the gifts of the Holy Spirit and impresses on the soul a character or mark that cannot be taken away.

2. Baptism is the sacrament of our unity with Jesus in His death and Resurrection.

Baptism unites the new Christian so closely with Jesus that he shares in Christ's death and Resurrection. Through this sacrament he dies to his old self and rises to new life. St. Paul says, "Know you not that all we, who are baptized in Christ Jesus, are baptized in His death? For we are buried together with Him by Baptism into death; that as Christ is risen from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3-4).

3. Baptism cleanses the soul from Original Sin and from all personal sins.

The result of Baptism is that a person is reconciled with God. His sins are forgiven, he receives a sharing in the life of God, and becomes part of God's people. Jesus said, "For God so loved the world as to give His only begotten Son; so that whoever believes in Him may not perish, but may have life everlasting. For God did not send His Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world may be saved by Him" (John 3:16-17).

Water is a sign of life-giving and of cleansing. The words signify that the life the person enters is that of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit unites us to Jesus, so that we may share with Him the life of God He brought into the world.

4. A person enters the Church by a new birth in Baptism.

The Church has always held that Baptism is necessary to become a member. For the believing Christian, the Catholic Church is the only place where he can live out his faith to the fullest. He needs to hear the Gospel again and again and to be a part of the continuing work of Jesus in the world. He needs the company of his fellow Christians as he grows in faith.

## Chapter Summary Prayer

### Chapter Ninety-Four

## The Sacrament of Confirmation

#### Q. 203. What is Confirmation?

Confirmation is a sacrament that confirms or strengthens the life of the Spirit which a person received at Baptism. In virtue of this sacrament, the faithful are obliged to spread and defend the Faith as true witnesses of Christ. (cf. V.S., Section 107, 108)

The principal sign of Confirmation is made by the Bishop, or priest, when he lays his hand upon the forehead of the candidate, anointing him with chrism [consecrated olive oil and balsam], and prays, "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit."

This sacrament, which seals a candidate with the Spirit, is linked with the other sacraments of Christian initiation — Baptism and the Eucharist.

After Baptism, through the Sacrament of Confirmation, Jesus sends the Holy Spirit again to Christian souls with the new grace and new strength that are needed in Christian lives. In the third century, St. Cyprian wrote: "They who are baptized...are presented to the Bishops...and by our prayers and the imposition of hands they receive the Holy Spirit and are perfected with the seal of the Lord" (Epistle 73).

Candidates renew their baptismal promises before Confirmation because of the intimate connection that there is between Confirmation and Baptism.

#### Q. 204. What does the seal of the Spirit do for us?

The seal of the Spirit prepares us (1) to be witnesses of Christ by living a mature Christian life and (2) to spread and defend the Faith while living in the world. (cf. V.S., Section 26, 107)

1. The seal of the Spirit prepares us to be witnesses of Christ by living a mature Christian life.

Confirmation binds the Christian more perfectly to the Church and enriches him with a special strength of the Holy Spirit, that he may live in the world as a witness of Christ and serve his fellow men. (cf. V.S., Section 108)

When the Bishop, or priest, administering this sacrament, anoints a person with chrism he says, "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit." Thus, by Confirmation, a baptized Christian becomes permanently marked as a witness and is obliged to communicate the Faith, with the price of his blood, if necessary. (cf. V.S., Section 76, 102, 107, 108)

2. The seal of the Spirit prepares us to spread and defend the Faith while living in the world.

Incorporated into Christ's Mystical Body through Baptism, and strengthened by the Holy Spirit through Confirmation, the laity are assigned to the apostolate, or the general mission of the Church, by the Lord Himself. We should remember the duty that was placed upon us when we were confirmed: we have the task of bringing Jesus Christ, His example, His way of life, and His Church to others. The strength which the grace of the Holy Spirit gives us will help us each day to fulfill our apostolate, if we are generous enough to show some effort and to ask for His help in prayer. (cf. V.S., Section 25, 107, 108)

### Vatican Council II

"The term 'laity' is understood to mean all the faithful except those in Holy Orders and those who belong to a religious state approved by the Church. That is, the faithful, who by Baptism are incorporated into Christ, are placed in the People of God, and in their own way they share the priestly, prophetic and kingly office of Christ. To the best of their ability, they carry on the mission of the whole Christian people in the Church and in the world.

"Their secular character is proper and peculiar to the laity." The Church, 31

"From the fact of their union with Christ the head flows the laymen's right and duty to be apostles. Inserted as they are in the Mystical Body of Christ by baptism and strengthened by the power of the Holy Spirit in confirmation, it is by the Lord himself that they are assigned to the apostolate." *Lay People*, 3

"The apostolate, through which the laity build up the Church, sanctify the world and get it to live in Christ, can take on many forms.

"A special form of the individual apostolate is the witness of a whole lay life issuing from faith, hope and charity; it is a sign very much in keeping with our times, and a manifestation of Christ living in his faithful. Then, by the apostolate of the word, which in certain circumstances is absolutely necessary, the laity proclaim Christ, explain and spread his teachings, each one according to his condition and competence, and profess those teachings with fidelity." *Lay People, 16*
